





GOOGLE THIS! CHROMEBOOKS FOR MIDDLE SCHOOLERS


As part of a focus on technology in the classroom, every middle school student at the school received their own Google Chromebook this year. "We want our students to learn and be prepared for the world that is more connected than ever, and a device like a Chromebook allows students to reach beyond the boundaries of their classroom," said Linda Joyner, principal at SMPS. "Having access and using current technology will better prepare them to be successful in the future." Technology is changing the way that we are teaching and learning. The focus of the Chromebook program is to provide tools and resources for the 21st century learner and allow for individualized instruction. The Chromebooks ensure that students can access what they need from wherever they are – every classroom and public area, anywhere with an internet connection. Chromebooks allow convenient access to online textbooks, tutorials, quizzes, test reviews,





and extra practice problems. In some classes using "flipped instruction" allows students to watch pre-recorded lessons while taking notes at their own pace. Flipped instruction allows for more one-on-one instruction. It helps students struggling with a concept to review previous instruction or students who miss a class access to the same instruction provided that day. The individual use of Chromebooks is a way to empower students to maximize their full potential and prepare them for high school and beyond.

SIXTH GRADERS PASSING ON LEGACY OF 'THE MAN IN THE RED BANDANA'

The sixth grade students at St. Mary Parish School were not even born when the twin towers fell on 9/11. The tragedy is a history lesson taught in the classroom with its most important legacy taught by the heroes of that day. The sixth grade students wrote letters to the parents of one such hero, Welles Crowther, or as he is famously known, "The Man in the Red Bandana." Crowther, a graduate of Boston College, lost his own life while saving the lives of numerous others in the World Trade Center. In return, the students received a letter from his parents and a package



that included a note from the athletic director of Boston College thanking them and said that the letters were "acknowledged and celebrated" on campus. The package also included official red bandanas that are distributed at Boston College's Red Bandana Game, which honors the life of Crowther.

Crowther has been the subject of several books and recognized for his selflessness and heroism. After September 11, 2001 survivors published stories about the man wearing a red handkerchief that had saved their lives. Crowther carried a red bandana from the time he was just six years old, wearing it under his lacrosse helmet and carrying it in his pocket wherever he went.

The students do not know a life before 9/11 and how much our world has changed since that day. Deanna Budney teaches social studies and religion at SMPS and knew that while the events and aftermath of September 11 can be difficult to talk about with children, its lessons are many.

"Maybe the most important lesson of that day is one of hope and our ability to triumph over tragedy," said Budney. "It's also a great

way to look at and show appreciation for our modern day heroes. Crowther's story is one of selflessness, bravery and heroism. In return, the students learned about how their words and actions can have a positive reaction. It has a ripple effect," said Budney. "They were deeply interested in Crowther's story and their appreciation for what he did shows in the words from their letters."

"Every day before school my mom tells me to do my best and let God do the rest," Matthew Lauer wrote in his letter to Crowther's parents. "That day your son did his best. Most heroes wear a cape, but Welles wore his red bandana."

"He was an amazing person," Josie Pliszka wrote in her letter.
"We should all be more like Welles, thinking of others before
ourselves. Whenever I see a red bandana I will think of a true hero,
Welles Crowther."

"Welles is a true hero because he cared for other people in need when they needed it most. It must be comforting knowing your son is a hero and that people thank God for his heroism daily," wrote another student, JJ Eagleeye. "Ever since I heard your story I asked my mom for a bandana. Every time I see it I will think of Welles."

The class was grateful to receive a message back from Alison Crowther, Welles' mother. She thanked them for sending their letters. She wrote, "I have read them all and we are deeply touched. It means the world to us that Welles' example impacts young people in many good and positive ways."

CELEBRATING CATHOLIC SCHOOL'S WEEK

Catholic School's week kicked off on January 30th. St. Mary Parish School's theme was Hooked on Catholic Education for 100 years, highlighting the school's centennial. The week is always a fun one! Some of this year's highlights included an Open House, a staff vs student basketball game, buddy pizza lunch and buddy color day, field trips to see a movie or roller and ice skating, a service outreach project (see sidebar), a special all-school mass and the Family Fun Fair. This year's Family Fun Fair event theme was Under God's Big Top. Decorations and games all tied into the



circus theme. New this year, and expected to become a popular event of future SMPS Catholic School's Weeks, was the air band competition. This was a chance to perform like your favorite rock star! Individuals or groups performed their songs for the school with choreographed dance moves and lip syncing to original artists. The distinguished panel of judges included: Chris Totero, Fr. John Burns and Diane Alioto. A total of 34 bands competed for bragging rights as well as a chance to take home the prestigious Best of Bands Award. Other awards included Best Costume and Props Award and the Sweet Moves Award.

K5 Firehouse Rockband received the Best Costumes and Props award for their performance to Uptown Funk by Bruno Mars. The Sweet Moves Award went to 4th grader, Camden Stroh for his Vote for Pedro dance from the movie Napoleon Dynamite. The Best of Bands (Elementary grades) was a group of second graders called The Whip who performed the Watch Me (Whip/



Nae Nae) by Silento'. The Best of Bands (Middle School) was won by a group of 7th grade boys called School of Pain who brought down the house as the final performance of the show. Dressed in Wisconsin attire and a Wisconsin Badger flag, the boys made their way off the stage through the audience and back to the stage to the song Jump Around by House of Pain. SERVICE

LIVING JESUS EVERY DAY

St. Mary Parish School makes service to others an integral part of its Catholic identity. Mindfulness and prayer for others is practiced throughout every school day. In addition, SMPS provides opportunities to put those thoughts and prayers into action by "Living Jesus." The school has integrated several favorite outreach programs to serve children in the community in which they live such as the Backpack Drive, Operation Christmas Child and the \$50 Stewardship Challenge. This year the first two of these outreach programs benefited Burmese refugee children

CATHOLIC SCHOOL'S WEEK OUTREACH

Catholic School's Week gave our students much joy, but it also was a time to remember that part of our Catholic identity is to "Live Jesus." It's important to provide help and joy to those in need. During Catholic School's Week SMPS collected birthday supplies and personal hygiene items for those in need. SMPS in



kindergarten through fifth grade prepared "birthday bags" that were donated to the Menomonee Falls Food Pantry. When a child has an upcoming birthday, a family in need will receive one of these ready-made birthday bags with the makings of a family birthday party: colorful napkins and paper plates, a toy, cake mix, frosting, candles, and a card.

Our middle school students worked to help some of the homeless in our community. Our parish has had a long standing relationship with St. Ben's Meal Program, run by the Capuchin Community and The House of Peace, that provides clothing and basic needs to the homeless. These organizations help those in need to obtain a meal, get a haircut and shower, obtain medical and legal assistance or even help earn their GED. Hygiene items are always in great need. Our middle school students collected soap, shampoo, deodorant, toothpaste, tooth brushes, hand lotion, razors, hand sanitizer and feminine products to make kits for individuals in need at these facilities. Fr. John Burns blessed the kits and prayed for all of those who would be receiving them. He reminded the students of our connectedness to all people and that we are all members of God's family.





living in Milwaukee. At the start of the school year backpacks were filled with notebooks, crayons, pencils, glue sticks and other essential school supplies to help 30 children. And this Advent the entire school community filled 120 Christmas boxes that included small toys, books, candies and personal hygiene items so that these children's Christmas would be a little brighter. The refugee families come to the United States with the hope of the American dream. Many arrive with nothing after surviving hunger and hardships in Thai refugee camps and must learn a new language and find a way to support their family in some of Milwaukee's most dangerous neighborhoods. "We must lead by example," said Linda Joyner, Principal. "Living Jesus isn't something we just say it is something we must teach and live every day."

\$50 CHALLENGE

The \$50 Stewardship Challenge is a major component of the Lenten season for the students and St. Mary Parish School Community. Each year our students find inspiration to help numerous worthy causes. Each class is given \$50 from the parish and asked to find a way to increase the amount to benefit those in need and is unique in that the students in each grade work together to choose the charity that is meaningful to them.

SUCCESS FOR FORENSIC TEAM

It was another successful season for the St. Mary Forensic team that is in its second year at the school. Forensics is an extracurricular program that concentrates on public speaking in a variety of formats. The team doubled in size to a total of 14 students, 11 of which were new to the program this year. They participated in six meets in which many of the students qualified for power rounds receiving individual awards. Thirteen



students qualified for the MLFA State Tournament in Neenah on Saturday, March 25. Together they joined 1900 students from 90 different teams at the tournament. Everyone did an outstanding job in the qualifying rounds. SMPS students selected for the Power Round included: Lilly Alberg– Storytelling; Emma Stueland-Poetry and Madison Voss-Serious Solo. Each of these students earned a medal for qualifying for the Power Round. Voss took third place and was awarded a trophy. Scott and Michelle Fleischmann and Linda Salentine served as coaches for the team.

LOVE FOR THE FINE ARTS

St. Mary Parish School is very proud of the many accomplishments of our teachers and their students in the fine arts. Music and art classes are an integral part of the curriculum. All our







teachers encourage creativity through drawing, painting, singing, dancing and writing. Performances for all grade levels are held throughout the year, and our students' artistic inspirations decorate nearly every hallway and corridor of SMPS. We have a strong art, music and theater program and many students get their first taste for the fine arts at SMPS and further develop their talents with the help of teachers, Susanne Shea, art; Amanda Prosser and Sharon Goessner, music; and theater, Marie Makal.

LARGEST JUNIOR ART DOCENT CLASS GRADUATES

On March 31, the third and largest group of fifth graders from St. Mary Parish School graduated from the Junior Docent School Program at the Milwaukee Art Museum (MAM). Since third grade the students have completed 10 trips to the MAM where they have learned about interpretation, art concepts and vocabulary from the pieces on display. The instruction provided assists in the development, awareness, and understanding of the visual



arts and connects it with history and culture. To complete the program Junior Docents must select an art piece that inspires them from the collection at the MAM. They must study the piece, recreate it, create an aesthetic response and then present an oral report in front of the original artwork at the MAM to a group of family, friends and peers. Aesthetic responses included poems, short stories, jewelry, singing an original song, a commercial, and a piano performance. A graduation ceremony was held for all the participants. Each student who completed the program received a certificate and a pin from the MAM. A reception of pizza and ice cream was held for the students at SMPS to celebrate their accomplishment. SMPS BUTTERFLY GARDEN SPROUTS

What started as a sixth grade science program about native Wisconsin plants and ecosystems has now sprouted into a school-wide effort to develop and maintain a butterfly garden and learning space at St. Mary Parish School. The garden began



as an extension of a program developed by SMPS middle school teacher, Dr. Cathy Ferderbar and Riveredge Nature Center to teach students about Wisconsin native plants and the ecosystem. The land behind the St. Mary Parish garage is being transformed into a beautiful garden with native plants and butterflies. The sixth grade students have begun mapping out planting areas in the garden where "big buddy-little buddy" partners will be planting seven types of native Wisconsin plants including: Coneflowers, Marsh Milkweed, Jacob's Ladder, Black Eyed Susan,

MAKALIZED PRODUCTIONS A LEGACY AT SMPS



Marie Green Makal has been teaching music and drama at St. Mary Parish School since 1986 and in that time she has created a legacy at SMPS. Her passion for music and theater is brought to life in her original productions that are put on by her students every school year. Despite her desire to retire from the classroom, she is continuing to produce the music choir and school theater productions. Makal is enthusiastic about building an appreciation for music and the theater and to enable every student from preschool through eighth grade to experience being part of a theatrical production. She encourages participation from all students and willingness to share their artistic gifts. Each theater production is unique and always wraps in the special talents of the students. It's true – you have never seen a production like the ones that are done at St. Mary Parish School. A Marie Green Makal production is unique. Students and the audience alike look forward to the special twists in the scripts and music choices added to every production that has popularly been coined "Makalized."

In only a few short weeks and during the regular school day, Makal provides scripts, holds auditions, rehearsals and preps the students for what many may agree are the most amazing youth theatre productions around. Whether a leading actor, a soloist or a dancer, a member of stage crew or as a comedic horse in the middle school play, every player has their part and Makal has a talent for finding just the right part for every student. Not everyone wants to be front and center on stage – and many others do. Makal is beyond talented at knowing her students, believing in them and bringing out their talents on stage.

Students are grouped by age for each of the three productions throughout the year with the oldest of each grouping as the starring roles. The Christmas play is the first production of the school year that is put on by kindergarten, first and second grades. Every year there is an appearance by Santa, his elves and reindeer and it is always capped off with a full Nativity play that always sets the right mood and illustrates the real meaning of Christmas. The spring play is put on by third, fourth and fifth grades and is usually classic children's theater. Such plays have included *The Wizard of Oz, Lion King* and *Annie*. This year the students put on *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory*. The Middle School production in May is the final production of the year. It is a final farewell for the 8th graders and an emotional final curtain call. Middle school plays have included *Bye Bye Birdie*, *Joseph The Dreamer* and *High School Musical*. A "Makalized" version of *Grease* finished production in May. Students at this age level can choose to forgo the stage and opt for a role in the stage and production crew, learning important behind-the-scenes jobs that go into every production such as props, lighting, audio, microphones, choreography, and sound quality.


Putting on three major productions a year encompassing nearly 400 students requires a lot of hard work and coordination from SMPS staff and parent volunteers. Teachers accommodate Makal during the weeks with their schedules and with school work. A team of parent volunteers on the Theatre Guild spends countless hours painting background sets, collecting and creating props, costuming and makeup for the entire cast. Also integral to every SMPS production is the talented Mark Mauer who produces every play at SMPS. Front and center of every play but rarely seen, Mauer passionately perfects the quality of every sound produced on and off the stage. There is a lot of hard work in a very short amount of time and it is Makal's love and her passion that has caught on and now drives them all. In just a few short weeks it all comes down to one full dress rehearsal with makeup, costumes and a school audience. The Activity Center is packed with family, grandparents and friends and the excitement has built to a boiling point as the final evening production is about to start. Makal and her students, the teachers and staff and a dedicated team of volunteers passionately give it everything they've got. It's their smiles, the roar of the applause, the commitment, and dedication that confirms they've all been "Makalized"... and in that lies her legacy.

Smooth Penstemon, Mist Flower and Little Blue Star grasses. St. Mary's Garden Club students have been busily digging out dead shrubs, removing weeds and preparing the soil. Over 100 starter plants have been provided to SMPS through a grant from the School Garden Program and Waukesha conservationist, Jayne Jenks. In addition, two rain barrels and a compost bin have been donated. A \$100 credit from the UW-Stevens Point Center for Environmental Education will go toward plantings in the garden. "The potential for learning is school-wide," said Ferderbar. Expansion plans are still underway but are expected to include a paved exploratory path through the garden, signage, and large flowering butterfly-friendly plants to entice the 100 butterflies that the K4, K5, first and second grade science students raise and release every June. The landscaping will also include benches where classes could gather or for quiet reflection or reading.

This spring nearly 75 students have joined the St. Mary Parish School Track Team. The team practices twice a week along with one other optional practice and participates in four track meets over the course of the month of May.
